METHODOLOGY



RESPONSES: 1241 TOTAL RESPONSES




RACE & ETHNICITY OF RESPONDENTS



City Infrastructure: Improve roads and sidewalks, improvements to City buildings, etc.	58.7%	584 responses
Investments in parks, public plazas, and other public recreation spaces.	47.9%	477 responses
Economic relief in the form of direct payments to tax payers.	42.6%	424 responses
Affordable Housing: Provide assistance to families, households, and communities facing housing insecurities that were exacerbated by the COVID-19 crisis.	31.4%	313 responses

SPECIFIC IDEAS FOR ARPA FUNDS

Respondents were asked to submit any specific ideas or uses for ARPA funds. There were 337 responses with varying degrees of specificity. The responses were coded into topics. Here is a breakdown of the most frequently mentioned topics.

1- Parks & Recreation/Sports/Open Spaces

There were 80 responses having to do with improved public spaces in the city of Cranston. These ranged from improving our parks and sports fields, better public access to fields, more parks and open spaces. Some of the top themes mentioned were:

- Indoor sports & recreation center/sports complex (25)
- Purchasing land for open spaces such as the Mulligan's Golf site (7)
- Reopening Budlong Pool (8)

2- Schools

There were 57 responses specific to Cranston schools. These were predominantly concerned with improved infrastructure for the school buildings, improved ventilation & HVAC systems at the schools, programs to deal with learning loss during the pandemic and mental health resources for students.

3- Affordable Housing

There were 17 responses specifically about more affordable housing in Cranston.

4- Economic/Tax Relief

There were 13 responses that dealt with some type of economic or tax relief for the residents of Cranston.

5- Roads/sidewalks

There were 13 responses concerning repairing roads and sidewalks throughout the city.

Other top themes included: planting trees, climate change preparedness and sustainability, small business assistance, resiliency and energy efficiency of city buildings, water infrastructure, library funding, assistance to seniors, food insecurity, and public safety funding
